Here are our five suggestions to add to your Highways UK itinerary:

1: Don't Miss Nick Harris's Opening Address

Nick Harris is National Highways' Chief Executive and opens the event each year. It's a chance for him to set the key goals for National Highways in the coming years. Make sure to be at the main theatre for 9:45 on Wednesday the 18th.

2: Attend Talks and Panels

3: Visit Stand 11, Grab a Coffee and Learn More About Passport

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A Passport to Safety 30,000 Active Workers On Passport!

We now have 30,000 active workers on Passport, which is an enormous milestone. The scheme delivers a more efficient and consistent approach to safety and ensures everyone has the right training to work across all our sites.

Meet our 30,000th Passport Holder

To celebrate the milestone, National Highways interviewed Karina Kanda from Skanksa, who was the 30,000th person to be awarded a safety passport. Here's what she had to say:

How did you hear about Highways Passport?

I heard about Highways Passport through my summer internship, which I began in July 2023. I was required to complete the Highways Passport induction to work on the M42 Project as part of my Skanska induction.

What does Passport mean to you and your role?

Gaining a Passport means I have a valuable tool and key to unlock future opportunities in the construction industry and within Highways. As a commercial intern starting out, I feel as if I have gained a better understanding of what it means to work on a construction site, and the health and safety concerns to be aware of, which I previously



didn't know about. Despite being an intern in an office-based role, having this knowledge is crucial to practising the safety standards when I'm out on a construction site.

Do you think Passport is useful and would you recommend it to other colleagues?

I think Passport is extremely beneficial to all employees working in the industry, whether you are starting out like me or have been in the industry for many years. I would recommend Passport to all my colleagues who are involved with projects, as it's an essential tool to protect and ensure safety standards are met.

How did you find the experience of obtaining Passport?

The Highways Common Induction was quick, engaging and equipped me with valuable knowledge as a new starter with no previous construction knowledge. I especially loved the fact that once I finished the online learning, there was a virtual Passport alongside the physical card, which I always carry with me on my phone.



How do you feel about being the 30,000th person to receive a Passport?

I feel honoured and excited to receive a Passport and come across this amazing opportunity! I love any opportunity to gain experience, learn and upskill myself, which the passport scheme has offered. It's good to know that so many of us are taking safety seriously.

Any other comments you would like to share?

I hope that National Highways continue to run the Passport scheme and offer further specialised training for staff working on site to ensure that the most up to date safety training is being used on sites. The smartcard is my Passport to work – it proves that I have undergone the relevant training to be on site.

How Passport is Unlocking a Leaner Future for Highways

Concrete Repairs are infrastructure specialists. They work globally and work anywhere concrete structures need TLC. They have been operating in the UK highways sector for twenty years, currently they work across SDF.

We need to get lean.

As a sector, we need to do more with less and do it better. It's a big ask, but with a skills shortage looming and razor-thin profit margins, we don't have a choice.

According to National Highways, we need to deliver £350 million in efficiencies by 2025 – and to do that we'll "<u>use Lean techniques, coupled</u> with the most effective technologies available."

Highways Passport is one of these technologies.

With Passport, we eliminate wasted time and we end up with a better result.

Here's one example, GD128.

As part of the Scheme Delivery Framework, highways contractors need to report on work hours each month. In the past, this involved about eight hours of input from five different people who would chase down time sheets, estimate working hours, tally up visitor totals, collate invoices – the list goes on.

It was a long process with an end result that was more estimate than fact.

Now, with Passport, I have an automated report which runs monthly. I turn it into a pivot table and send it on.

That's hundreds of hours a year hacked down to only six. As we get more projects, this saving will only grow.

And the output of Passport is fact. No more estimating needed.

Pretty lean.

That's one example. I could have spoken about inductions, safety inspections, spot checks, briefings, messaging, audits – we have folders of training information that are four feet high that we can't wait to eliminate with Passport.

We are using it to decimate wasted resource. So should you.

For my part, I see Highways Passport as an essential part of a leaner highways supply chain.



Let's Get You Registered

Teresa Moss, National Highways Health and Safety Business Partner Highways Passport is endorsed by National Highways and sponsored by the Supply Chain Safety Leadership Group because it demonstrates that workers have the training, experience, and qualifications they need to work safely on any National Highways site.

However, there have been several reports recently that some contractors have arrived at site without a Highways Passport or the Highways Common Induction. National Highways has an expectation that anyone who attends site to work on the network must have a Highways Passport.

There are few exceptions such as accompanied visitors to site and delivery drivers who are guided through site.

You need to sign up to the Passport scheme to be able to complete the Highways Common Induction.
